Except for an application fee, these residencies are fully funded to those accepted. Open to students, domestic and international artists unless otherwise stated.

701 Center for Contemporary Art (Columbia, SC)

6-12 weeks, funded, with stipend and materials budget

Artists in residence at the center create new works while in residence. Generally, an exhibition or some public presentation of these works takes place during or shortly after the residency. In most cases, artists in residence are also expected to involve the community in some fashion.

9-month residency, funded with \$3000 unrestricted stipend, no students, US-only, no housing or meals provided. The workspace programs provide residencies and free workspace in which established and emerging artists can develop their work and careers. The programs have fostered the creative process for innovative performing and visual artists.

ACA Soundscape Field Station at Canaveral National Seashore (New Smyrna Beach, FL)

4-6 weeks, \$2400 honorarium, housing, \$50/day offered to cover food costs, ADA accessibility- yes

ACA Soundscape Field Station at Canaveral National Seashore, managed jointly by Atlantic Center for the Arts and Canaveral National Seashore is designed to provide a creative platform where sound artists and scientists can discover sustainable solutions and raise awareness of sound as a natural resource. The goal for each artist-in-residence is to find innovative approaches that help preserve a healthy and balanced soundscape for current and future generations. Artists are encouraged to explore innovative ideas about environmental health and soundscape preservation. Each resident is required to volunteer time each week to interact with park visitors and facilitate community outreach.

3-month residency, funded, monthly stipend, travel stipend, U.S. artists only

This project aims to nurture artists from a diverse range of backgrounds and uplift the work of artists, with a particular focus on underrepresented perspectives and voices. We welcome all visual artists working with a wide range of mediums. Two artists at one time participate in our residency program: one local Sacramento artist, the Verge Resident, and one artist from out of town, the WAL Resident.

Aminha Brenda Lynn Robinson Residency for African American Artists (Columbus, OH)

90-day residency, housing and studio provided, \$2500 award + stipend, meals not provided, not ADA accessible
The Greater Columbus Arts Council, in partnership with the Columbus Museum of Art, offers an artist residency for U.S.-based professional African American visual artists. MacArthur Fellow Aminah Brenda Lynn Robinson's work is all about building bridges and making connections between the past and the present, America and Africa, and the physical world and the world of spirits. She created art to pass these stories on to future generations in the spirit of Sankofa—the African concept of knowing one's past in order to go forward.

1-month residencies, housing/meals/studio provided

The Center makes available private time and space to some 45 artists, writers, and scholars from the United States and abroad. Residencies, which include meals and lodging at the Center, are for two weeks to one month, during which time resident-fellows are expected to work on a clearly defined project and to make a substantive contribution to the community in the form of a talk, class, or performance of their work.

Jerome Emerging Artist Residency Program: This program in August 2021 is an opportunity for early career / emerging artists living within the state of Minnesota or one of the five boroughs of New York City to participate in a supportive and inspiring residency environment that empowers them to take risks, embrace challenges, and utilize unconventional approaches to problem-solving. Thanks to support from the Jerome Foundation, a month-long cohort of five artists will each receive a \$625/week stipend, a travel honorarium, documentation support, and more.

Annenberg Helix Fellowship (Los Angeles, CA)

Helix is open to artists who are working at the professional level in their field in any creative medium or discipline; students and educators at a recognized institution; and community activists working in any field. As part of the program's commitment to approaching cultural studies in a world-historical context, Helix is open to participants of all backgrounds who wish to explore this part of the world through the lens of Yiddish in the most creative, direct, and personal way possible. The Helix Fellowship unfolds over two calendar years—in early August of the first year we offer a 10-day intensive colloquium in Southern California followed by regular online workshops during fall, winter, and spring. In the second year we offer Yiddishkayt's signature summer travel experience to Central and Eastern Europe that begins in Southern California and spans the full month of July.

Antenna: Paper Machine Residency (New Orleans, LA)

1 month residency, fully funded, \$1500 honorarium, paid travel to and from New Orleans, materials provided, meals not provided, no students, ADA accessibility-no

Artists must apply with a proposed project. The Residency will annually welcome 6-8 artists — split evenly to feature a mix of local and national/international artists to realize unique proposals for print-focused projects and public programs. Over the course of a month-long residency at Paper Machine, Artists-in-Residence will: 1) develop original editioned work under the broadly defined rubric of printmaking, including publications, sculptural books, zines, multiples, and other such works; and 2) will present complementary programs that engage the public in their artistic process, which could include participatory compositions, workshop, or artist talk.

The residency program is designed to provide pre-professional, self-directed artists time and space to develop a major body of work in a creative community environment of students and visiting faculty. Five artists are selected annually to participate in the program that begins mid-June and continues through the end of May the following year.

Art Farm's artist residency program for professionals, in all areas of the arts, offers them accommodation and studio space to pursue their art. We ask, in exchange, for 12 hours per week from artists, to help renovate and maintain Art Farm's buildings and grounds as well as other projects. All who apply need to be self-motivated and resourceful and appreciate a quiet working environment--if you need a busy social life this may not be for you. Art Farm's location is semi-isolated and rural and because of this condition, co-operation, and an ability to share tasks are required.

Art Omi hosts international visual artists, writers, musicians, architects, and dancers on 300 acres in the Hudson Valley region of New York, amidst a 10-acre contemporary sculpture park, The Fields Sculpture Park. Omi has been guided by the vision that creative work is a vehicle for knowledge and understanding that transcends political and cultural boundaries. To this end, Omi has hosted over hundreds of residents from 80 different countries to date. Omi provides residents with room, board, and a place to work.

Artist in Residence Everglades (Homestead, FL)

Month-long residency, \$4000 fellowship grant, furnished accommodations, food/travel stipend, ADA accessibility-yes (additional accommodations can be made with advanced notice)

Connection to scientists, researcher, and practitioners working in the Everglades, opportunities to connect with other AIRIE Fellows, public engagement opportunities through AIRIE and Everglades National Park programming, including the annual AIRIE Environment + Art Summit. Artists are expected to spend time exploring, learning about, and responding to the dynamic qualities of Everglades National Park and local communities. Artists are required to respect Park Regulations. They should not bring natural, organic materials to the park, should not use organic materials from the park in creating work, and should not remove any natural materials from the Park. Their work must not involve ground disturbances or manipulation of wildlife in any way. It is the resident's responsibility to be informed of Park rules and to follow them.

ARTSail is a nomadic, floating art project that seeks to provide artists and cultural practitioners the opportunity to research and explore the extensive coastlines and waterways that surround Miami. ArtCenter will host the residencies on Miami's waterways on an off-board vessel where artists will be invited to further existing research or generate new work in response to Miami's relationship to water. ARTSail residencies aim to develop awareness in the community about environmental concerns and engage the public in the discovery, preservation, and protection of South Florida's waterways. The participating artists will be invited to collaborate with scientists and/or science students involved with the Patricia and Philip Frost Museum of Science.

Residencies at Baltimore Clayworks range begin each September. Because artists are engaging in a community-based residency, they are expected to perform weekly studio chores, participate in both studio and organizational functions, and help with fund-raising events. Selection of residents is highly competitive and based on the quality of work, the potential for growth, and a commitment to building a clay-oriented community.

For more than three decades, the Bemis Center's core mission has been to provide artists from around the world dedicated time, space, and resources to conduct research and to create new work. Frequently cited as one of the top international residency programs, the Bemis Center offers artists private live/work studios, financial support, technical/administrative assistance, and opportunities for intellectual discourse about contemporary art through free public programs, such as panel discussions, lectures, and knowledge-sharing workshops. To date, nearly 900 artists have participated in the residency program.

USD and living quarters for the recipient. In exchange, they will create a site-specific sculpture or project or exhibition, with at least one mutually agreed to work of art left to the Bernheim Foundation.

BAC residencies have three important parts: All residents must attend evening meals (provided by BAC) with their fellow artists. All residents must have a plan of action for what they will complete during their time at BAC. All residencies must include a public component accessible to the outside community that connects to their residency plan. This may include open studio visits, presentations, teaching a class/workshop, works-in-progress showing, exhibition, or other outreach or community engagement project. BAC will help you schedule your public component, but it is up to you to plan how you will execute this event and identify any outside community partners that you are interested in working with.

Bunnell Street Arts Center presents an Artist in Residence program for International, US, or Alaska artists to create artwork exploring community engagement and creative placemaking. To engage the community and impart a lasting effect, the artist is expected to provide an artist talk, a community engagement component, and / or contribute a work of art created during the residency for installation, exhibit, performance, reading, screening or other upon mutual agreement with Bunnell's Artistic Director. Residencies are generally not available in June, July, or August.

Workspace Artist-in-Residence: Each year, up to five New York-based emerging artists are offered space, time and support to explore the production and exhibition of artists' books and related work in year-long residencies. The purpose of this program is to promote experimentation in making book art – thus artists from all disciplinary backgrounds are encouraged to apply.

Book Artist-in Residence: Each year Center for Book Arts awards 3 to 4 residencies to artists who have demonstrated a commitment to the book arts as a key component of their artistic practice. The Book Artist Residency has a goal to fortify the practice of early career artists in the book arts, to provide access to professional equipment, financial support, specialized training, career advancing opportunities, space to work, and to strengthen and diversify the community of book artists working within the New York area.

CPW's Artist-In-Residence Program provides opportunities for US-based artists and critics/scholars/curators of color working in photography with access to facilities and financial, critical, and technical support. 24/7 access to CPW's workspace facilities, including darkroom, digital lab (large format printers, flatbed, and dedicated film scanners), and library. The drive for this program is to free the artist from the busy routines and demands of everyday life – and to provide a sanctuary for creativity. Each year CPW offers seven residencies for artists of color and one residency for a critic/scholar/curator of color.

Centrum's Emerging Artist Residency is an initiative to support artists at the beginning of their career trajectory. Artists must be residents of British Columbia, Idaho, Montana, Oregon, or Washington, and have a demonstrated commitment to artistic practice. Centrum invites a cohort of six visual artists from the Northwest region to be in residence during the month of October each year.

Charlotte Street's Studio Residency Program provides free studio and rehearsal spaces to a mixed disciplinary cohort of exceptional artists for 2 year-long terms. Through the program's offerings—which include free studio space, advisors, public programs, monthly cohort meetings and presentations, studio visits and access to a multidisciplinary network of artist peers—Charlotte Street's Studio Residency Program encourages creative production, artistic experimentation, professional development, and community building.

BOLT Residency is a highly competitive, juried, one-year artist studio residency program offering emerging and established artists the opportunity to engage the Chicago arts community and its public in critical dialogue about contemporary art. Applicants must be a resident of the city of Chicago. Works on paper, sculpture, painting, photography, new media, installation, film, performance, and sound artists are encouraged to apply. BOLT Residency studios have an open floor plan with each studio measuring approximately 200 square feet. HATCH Projects is a yearlong, juried incubator for contemporary Chicago artists and curators that strives to support an ecology of curatorial and artistic practice. HATCH fosters shared experimentation, exchange, and creativity to produce ground-breaking exhibitions and programs. Applicants must be a resident of the city of Chicago.

Chinati Foundation (Marfa, TX)

2-3 months, \$1000 stipend for travel and materials, housing provided
The Chinati Foundation's Artist in Residence program was instituted in 1989 with the aim of supporting the development of artists of diverse ages, backgrounds, and disciplines. The program provides an opportunity for

artists from around the world to work in a striking, natural environment. Exhibitions are often held at the conclusion of the residency. These become an important part of the museum's temporary exhibition program and provide a vital counterpoint to the permanent collection. The Chinati Foundation provides a furnished apartment on the museum's grounds and a studio in Marfa. Resident artists have unlimited access to Chinati's collection and archive, and the museum staff and interns are available to assist in securing materials and preparing exhibitions.

Chulitna Lodge Wilderness Retreat (Lake Clark National Park, AK)

Chulitna Lodge Artist-In-Residence Program seeks to provide the time, space, clarity, and facilities for all forms of creative professionals to make and meditate. It is 180 miles west of Anchorage, Alaska. The property is an inhaling on hundreds of square miles of national park, so there are no roads leading in or out, only access is by plane.

The Core Program awards residencies to exceptional, highly motivated visual artists and critical writers who have completed their undergraduate or graduate training and are working to develop a sustainable practice. Core fellows come together as a community of thinkers and makers to engage in an ongoing dialog, the content of which is driven by contemporary concerns, the interests and work of the fellows, and the Core lecture series and visitors.

Corning Museum of Glass – the Studio Artists-in-Residence and the BIPOC Residency (Corning, NY)

The Studio's Artist-in-Residence program brings artists from around the world to Corning. The artists spend a month at The Studio, exploring new directions in glass art, or expanding on their current bodies of work, while using the immense resources of the world's leading glass museum. At the end of the residency, each artist gives a presentation about his or her work.

The BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, and people of color) Residency is a way of actively fostering a culture and community of inclusion that promotes, respects, and celebrates this community. BIPOC artists are welcome to apply for this residency and for our other residencies.

Corsicana Artist and Writer Residency (Corsicana, TX)

1-4 months, fully funded, partially funded, non-funded options

Artists and writers are granted residencies to work in large, historic rooms repurposed for studio space within a nineteenth century Texas oil boom downtown. Private studios are provided alongside complete living accommodations and wood shop access. This residency experience combines artist-made furniture with period pieces in a structure virtually unaltered since the 1890s. 100W maintains a close connection with Dallas, Houston, and Austin - each within 50 - 200 miles from downtown Corsicana, where faded vestiges of earlier industry offer quintessential Texas atmosphere.

Crater Lake National Park (Crater Lake, OR)

The program provides an opportunity for two eligible artists to spend up to two weeks of the fall, and another two artists for up to two weeks in the spring, at Crater Lake National Park to pursue their particular art form while surrounded by the awe-inspiring landscape of the park. Artists are provided housing in the park to work on projects in one of the most beautiful places on Earth! Writers, sculptors, photographers, painters, dancers, cinematographers, musicians, composers, and other visual and performing artists are invited to apply for this opportunity to draw upon the multifaceted qualities of the park for inspiration.

Denbo Fellowship at the Pyramid Atlantic Art Center (Hyattsville, MD)

The Denbo Fellowship is designed to offer artists from a range of artistic disciplines an environment conducive to individual and collaborative creative practice. It provides a unique opportunity to complete a new body of work at Pyramid Atlantic Art Center in the areas of papermaking, printmaking, and book arts. Includes ten hours of one-on-one technical assistance. Each applicant will be judged on the artistic merit of his/her work, interest and potential in printmaking, paper arts and book arts (or a combination thereof), as well as the quality and clarity of his/her plan for the residency. Although previous experience in a Pyramid Atlantic discipline may be helpful to a successful applicant, such experience is not necessary or expected. Artists are also asked to give an artist talk during their residency.

Cost for artist couples/small collectives \$1400/month and includes 2 bedrooms and the entire residency studio. All utilities included: internet access, laundry, sauna, chickens. In addition to the housing, studios, and facilities offered here at Popp's, we also connect residents to our large network of local artists, resources, and organizational and institutional partners through informal gatherings, open studios, exhibitions and performances. We focus on long-term residences because in our short-winded times artists are rarely willing to invest the necessary time span to understand the Greenlandic Arctic. Encountering the end of the world, the unknown and mystical Ultima Thule became intellectual fast food, the artist's mission completed with the return from short «study-visits», filled with impressions and opinions made up before arrival, often presenting the artists back home as explorers and experts. Because they have been there. The consumption of the Arctic as an exotic place

might add some fancy event on the CV of a visiting artist, but it will not contribute to the Arctic. To speak with Edward Said's criticism of Orientalism: the Arctic is nothing more than a simplification, western concept which compensates lack of knowledge by projecting a worldview towards a place far away. A short residency doesn't challenge the artists perception and thus the mental construct rooted in subjective experience isn't congruent with the physical and psychological space. We are interested in artistic processes, experimentation, and fearless curiosity in respectful interaction with the local community. We expect our residency artists to be aware of research methodologies related to indigenous people and to accept our expectation of a reciprocal approach. The residency gives visitors a unique opportunity to discover Greenland's cultural and sociopolitical context. We expect our residency guests to be aware of research methodologies related to indigenous peoples and to accept our expectation of a reciprocal approach. Through this, artists and curators can expand the scope of their practice and learn about the under-communicated Greenlandic art scene.
